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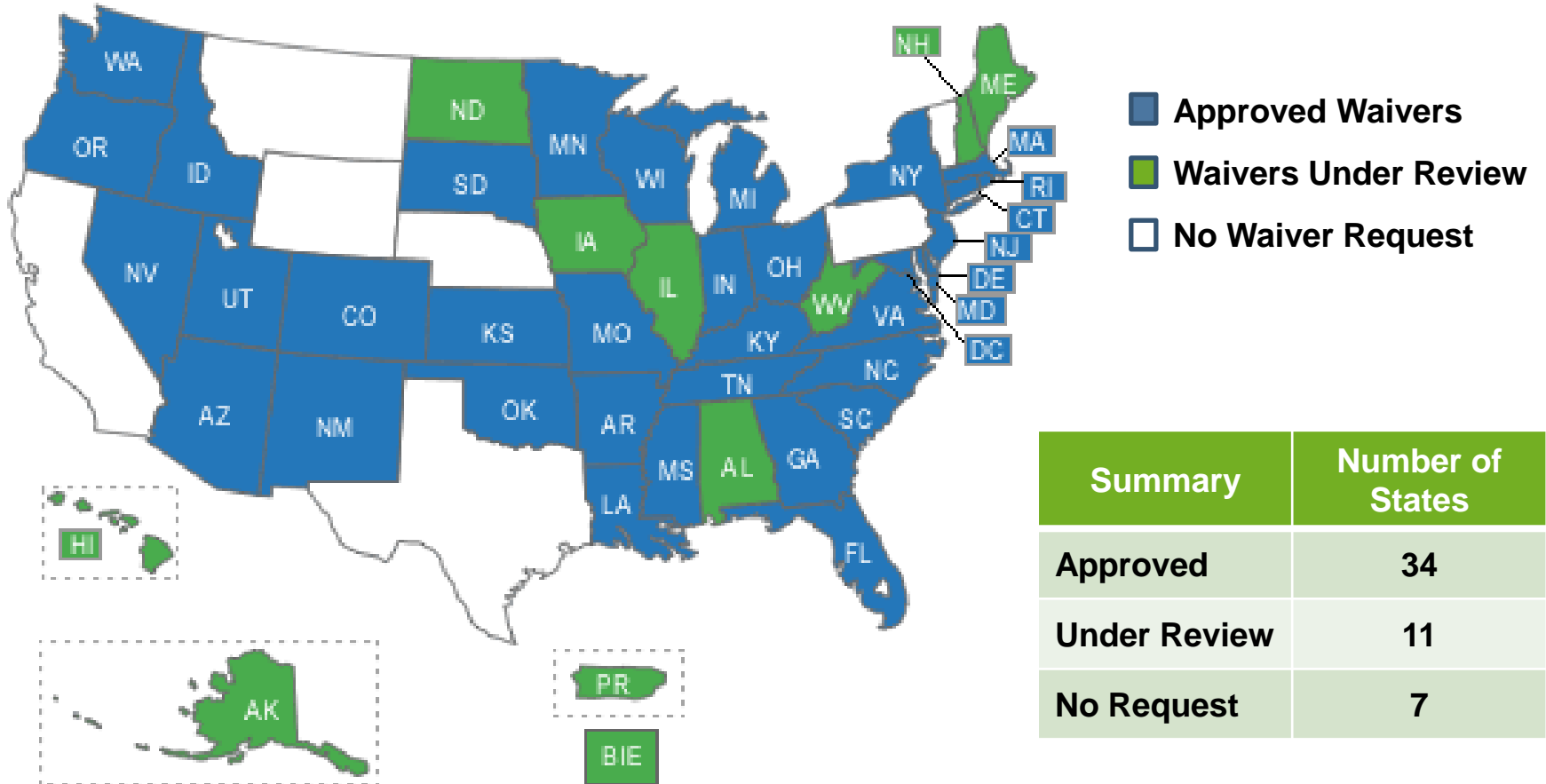

# Tennessee: Using Technology

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- The Tennessee Department of Education (TDOE) has developed a robust data system that allows LEA leaders and TDOE real-time access to data.
- TDOE's data system allows for quality control of the evaluation system, determines how the system aligns with value-added scores, and ensures validity of non-state-approved models.

# Virginia: Additional Reporting

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- The Virginia Department of Education has developed an automated system to collect and review information from each district on performance standards and evaluation systems.
- Districts are required to report the following annually:
  - Description of the evaluation system
  - How evaluations are tied to professional development, compensation, etc.
  - Role of student achievement measures in evaluation
  - Number of teachers (by school) and principals (by district) who receive each evaluation rating

# Michigan: Using Incentives

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- Michigan Department of Education (MDE) does not have authority regarding compliance of educator evaluations.
- MDE leverages its authority to gather data for the state report cards and offers incentives via state highlighting to help ensure compliance.
  - Hold schools accountable for submitting 100 percent of their required effectiveness labels in the new Accountability Scorecard.
  - Cross-reference reported educator effectiveness labels with available student assessment data.
  - Encourage districts to voluntarily submit their evaluation plans for MDE review. MDE will highlight districts that have designed comprehensive and rigorous evaluation systems in published case studies.



# Oregon: Engaging Partnerships

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- Oregon Department of Education (ODE) has partnered with Education Northwest to assist with monitoring and compliance of teacher and principal evaluation systems.
- They are piloting a peer review process using Peer Review Panels (master teachers, principals, Education Northwest staff, etc.) to appraise districts' systems for alignment with state guidelines and to identify technical assistance needs.
- By July 1, 2015, all Oregon districts must present their local evaluation and support systems to a Peer Review Panel, which will report compliance to ODE by August 15, 2015.
